The First Reading: Revelation 19.6-10

⁶ Then I heard again what sounded like the shout of a vast crowd or the roar of mighty ocean waves or the crash of loud thunder:

"Praise the Lord!

For the Lord our God, the Almighty, reigns.

⁷Let us be glad and rejoice, and let us give honour to him.

For the time has come for the wedding feast of the Lamb, and his bride has prepared herself.

She has been given the finest of pure white linen to wear."
For the fine linen represents the good deeds of God's holy people.

⁹ And the angel said to me, "Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding feast of the Lamb." And he added, "These are true words that come from God."

¹⁰ Then I fell down at his feet to worship him, but he said, "No, don't worship me. I am a servant of God, just like you and your brothers and sisters who testify about their faith in Jesus. Worship only God. For the essence of prophecy is to give a clear witness for Jesus."

The Gospel: John 2.1-11

2 The next day there was a wedding celebration in the village of Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there, ² and Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the celebration. ³ The wine supply ran out during the festivities, so Jesus' mother told him, "They have no more wine."

⁴ "Dear woman, that's not our problem," Jesus replied. "My time has not yet come."

⁵ But his mother told the servants, "Do whatever he tells you."

⁶ Standing nearby were six stone water jars, used for Jewish ceremonial washing. Each could hold twenty to thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus told the servants, "Fill the jars with water." When the jars had been filled, ⁸ he said, "Now dip some out, and take it to the master of ceremonies." So the servants followed his instructions.

⁹When the master of ceremonies tasted the water that was now wine, not knowing where it had come from (though, of course, the servants knew), he called the bridegroom over. ¹⁰ "A host always serves the best wine first," he said. "Then, when everyone has had a lot to drink, he brings out the less expensive wine. But you have kept the best until now!"

¹¹This miraculous sign at Cana in Galilee was the first time Jesus revealed his glory. And his disciples believed in him.

This week's reflection from Joy

What preparations do you make before a big social event, especially before a wedding? How do you decide what to wear? Attending such an event is a 'big deal' for most of us, and we spend time and energy planning every aspect of getting there, what to wear, and what gift to take.

Likewise, the bride and groom will have put a great deal of time and effort into planning the occasion, they will have spent many hours discussing who to invite, what was needed in the way of food and drink, what they were going to wear and so on. Wedding feasts take preparation, even the feast of the bride of heaven involved some preparation, as she was clothed in the purest white linen.

But despite all our planning and preparations, things can go wrong. A car breaks down at an inopportune moment, the heavens open when sun had been forecast, someone becomes ill or gets injured. Some of you may have even been to a wedding where there was insufficient food or drink, much to the embarrassment of the hosts.

When I conduct a wedding in church, I always remind the couple of the vows they have made to each other, to love one another and remain faithful to each other through all the ups and downs of life, for better or worse, for richer or poorer, in sickness or health, for we all know that life is not 'plain sailing' and there are times when things will go wrong, and life will be difficult. Now there is nothing surprising in this, we have all experienced the ups and downs of life, but there are times when the embarrassment of things going wrong can have major implications. Today, if we were to attend a wedding where the wine ran out, we would be aware of the embarrassment of the hosts, and probably laugh about it with them on a future occasion. However, at the time of Jesus it could been seen as a social disgrace, that could have reverberations for generations to come, and may have even resulted in a lawsuit between the families concerned. Maybe this is why Mary asked her son to intervene, and help out the host, ignoring his reluctance. I sometimes find it hard to read this passage without hearing a bolshie 'so what!' that you would get from a stroppy

teenager, but Jesus is not the stroppy teenager, and I am sure his response to his mother was spoken with respect.

From the very beginning of his ministry, Jesus is clearly aware of his destiny and there is nothing he can do the either prevent it, or pervert it. Jesus may not feel that the time is right to reveal his glory, but his subsequent actions show his respect for, and obedience to his mother, and so he does reveal his glory as he instructs the servants to refill the stone jars with water!

These stone jars would have contained water essential for the purification rites of the guests, the fact that so many jars were present that could hold so much water might be an indication of the size or extent of the gathering for this wedding. I wonder what the servants thought as they refilled the jars. I can only imagine their total astonishment on being told to draw some of the water from the jars and present it to the master of ceremonies. The servants knew that water was poured into the jars, but what was drawn out was wine, and not just any old supermarket plonk but the finest Chateau Lafite of the day, and between them the jars would have contained not just the equivalent of a few bottles of wine, but the equivalent of between 600 and 900 bottles of the best wine! I doubt even Mary expected such an abundant response to her request.

There was no need for so much wine to complete the celebration, so what we have here is a clear example of God's glory and the abundance of his grace, as Jesus changed the water of Judaic purification into the new wine of the Kingdom of God! God's grace poured out in total extravagant abundance!

We recall this abundance every time we celebrate Communion, when we remember the blood of the lamb, the new covenant, poured out for us for the forgiveness of our sins. Jesus' glory was revealed on the cross, for "his time" came when he died on the cross, that we might be forgiven and reconciled to God for all eternity, given our place at the eternal wedding feast of the Lamb.

By his actions, Jesus avoided the embarrassment of his hosts, and he demonstrated his concern for all aspects of our lives. Even some of the trivial minor problems we face daily. I know some people who recognising this, will

pray to Jesus for all manner of things: what clothes to put on in the morning; what to eat; for help in finding a car parking space; for a sunny day, and so on. And there is nothing wrong with this, although I tend not to do so. I am always aware that just because I left home late does not mean I have a greater need for the space in the car park, or the sunny weather I might like for my day out, would be wrong for the farmer desperate for rain for his crops. I don't want to limit God, but neither do I want to prioritise my needs over another's.

This does not change the fact that God is interested in even the small crises of our lives, he wants us to invite him in, he wants to be generous as he blesses us, he may even do the miraculous for us, but we have to ask first.

So, what is there in your life you would like to ask God to help you with? What crises are you facing?

Ask God, and give him space to respond, you may only need a bottle of wine, but you might end up with 900! At the same time do not be surprised that God does not answer your prayer the way you wanted. Maybe the space at the carpark you wanted was needed by another. We can ask, but we cannot dictate how God will respond, any more than Mary could say how Jesus would respond to her request.

So, just ask!
